They will equip them with the tools to give young people the necessary confidence and skills not to drink before they should, and reduce the frequency and amount of drinking occasions.

Example of a school-based programme with demonstrated impact being adapted for an EU setting

Dr Michael McKay, STAMMP Trial Manager at Liverpool John Moores University

Dr Mckay will present the findings from his research on an adapted version of the school health and alcohol harm reduction project (SHARP) in Northern Ireland. Dr Mckay will also present findings from a secondary analysis indicating specific effects of the intervention on population subgroups.

How do we change perception around peer use of alcohol and other risky behaviours?

Dr John McAlaney, Chartered Psychologist at Bournemouth University

Research has demonstrated that individuals, and particularly young adults, tend to substantially overestimate the use of alcohol and other substances by their peers. Dr McAlaney will present "SNIPE", an EU funded project across 7 EU countries that aimed to explore the feasibility of developing an online prevention and intervention system to challenge such misperceptions.


